
ALUMNI SUMMARY

The students from the Broadhurst Era (1936 - 1960) by nature are a clearly defined and limited group of special people who had the privilege of being instrumental in laying a foundation and philosophy that still holds true. The School aims to educate "Body, Mind and Spirit" and still has a strong focus on music. It was a past student Richard Wrightson (1950 to 1953) on a visit to the school who said "the school still adheres to the traditional values of schooling but provides educational opportunities that are cutting edge and relevant."

We have identified a total of 616 pupils who attended during this period. Unfortunately we have recorded 136 positive deceased (but suspect more in our unidentified list).

We have current contact details in the form of either/and postal addresses and email addresses for a further 280. We are working to increase this from the pool of unknown contact details which number 190 (but of these we have possible addresses and contacts for about 20). We are just waiting on verification and several who we believe are deceased which we are waiting confirmation on.

In our newsletters we will provide details of some missing and some of the deceased. (We will aim to have a full list of both available on the website, it is currently available on request).



JEREMY ADDIS (1942 - 1945)

The war considerately ended when my primary education was also finished, and from 1945 to 1948 I was at Gresham's School in Norfolk, which in many respects was not unlike St Peter's.

There was an orchestra that made enough noise to drown my viola, and school plays which left me with an abiding love of the stage.


I served the then compulsory two years of 'national service' in the RAF, hoping to be selected as aircrew, as I had just earned my private pilot's licence, but instead became an 'Assistant Education Officer'.

David Brewster late of St Peter's was doing his service in the army only a few miles from my station and I motor biked

over complete with viola to make a quartet of his trio, but made such an embarrassing mess of sight-reading, that I promptly sold the instrument and so ended my musical career. Did Brewster really become a bishop?

Self-taught, I started a shoestring printing business in London and, not long after marrying and begetting three sons in five years, accepted the inevitable and looked for a job – which brought me to a publishing house in Dublin. As a spare-time occupation in 1976 I started a monthly reviewing magazine, Books Ireland, and with Arts Council subsidy this became my full-time job in 1990.

NEW JUNIOR (PREP) SCHOOL BLOCK OPENING

It was a special occasion on 6 June 2014 when we officially opened the school's Junior Block, a ten classroom facility built in the area between the Chapel and the Kahikatea stand.

The event marked more than the opening of a new building – it signified St Peter's coming full circle in its classroom rebuilding cycle.

St Peter's opened in 1936 as a preparatory boys' boarding school, the legacy of which lives on with what is still called the 'Prep School' for our Year 7 and 8 students. Up until last year, our Prep students were still being taught in the original classroom building.

Seventy eight years on, our 1936 students would barely recognise the classroom environment in our stunning new Junior Block.

At the building's heart is an open plan atrium which extends to ten classrooms and opens out to an outdoor space overlooking the school's pond and Kahikatea stand.

The building has been designed to be flexible and interactive, with large glass walls and doors which slide open or closed to create larger or more intimate work spaces. The colourful furniture can be pulled apart and pushed together in multiple ways and even the whiteboards, projectors and touch screen computers are mobile.

Speaking at the opening, Principal Steve Robb thanked the St Peter's Trust Board for their vision and commitment in

making this project happen. The innovative design took 38 drafts to perfect and, while drawing inspiration from the original Lippincott design of St Peter's, represents a markedly different building style for the school.

The result is a magnificent new building which is distinctly modern, functional, energy-efficient and perfectly suited to our junior students.

Invited to open the building were members of the Eyre family, who have been part of St Peter's since day one with Colin and Henry Eyre attending the school as first day boys in 1936 and '37.

Over the years 11 members of the Eyre family have attended St Peter's. Mark Eyre, who is both a past student and a former teacher at the school, shared with those gathered at the opening his family's experiences at the school throughout the years, giving an insight to what it was like to be here over the decades.

After a blessing of the building, guests proceeded inside for the Vallentine Room dedication. The room has been named in memory of Richard "Dick" Vallentine, one of the school's first pupils.



DICK VALLENTI NE (1936-1937)

IN MEMORY OF RICHARD (DICK) VALLENTINE 16 APRIL 1923 – 25 NOVEMBER 2012

One of the school's first pupils, Richard (Dick) Vallentine attended St Peter's in 1936 and 1937. Richard looked back fondly on his time here and left the school a substantial donation on his passing in 2012. Richard's generosity has not only helped fund the new Junior Block, but also enabled the school to offer several 'Vallentine Scholarships' to Year 7 and 8 students.

Richard led a varied life during his 89 years. After he finished school, he enlisted in the RNZAF in 1942 and after receiving his training at Wigram was based in Canada during WW2. Following the war, he returned to New Zealand and followed his father's footsteps into the mining industry, graduating from the Otago School of Mines in 1949.



Richard married Patricia (Pat) Thorburn in 1950 and together they embarked for

Africa, where they would reside for nearly three decades. Richard joined Luanshya mine in 1950, in what was then known as Northern Rhodesia (now Zambia). His subsequent promotions took him to the position of mine superintendent in 1965 and assistant manager in 1967. He was appointed manager at Mufulira copper mines in 1969. In 1976 Richard and Pat made the move to Botswana, where Richard took up the position of general manager for BCL Ltd.

Richard and Pat returned to New Zealand in 1979 and lived in Nelson, while he continued to work as a mine consultant. After a stint in Port Douglas, Australia, in the late 1980s, Richard eventually settled in Tauranga for his retirement.

Richard travelled extensively throughout Africa, as well as abroad, and his family recall viewing many slides of African game and scenery from his travels. He was also a keen fly fisherman, photographer and a member of the Masonic Lodge.


Richard was pre-deceased by Pat and the couple had no children.

GRAHAM RUSSELL (MINOR) 1948 – 1953

NO. 6 LIGHT BLUE - BORN 6 JANUARY 1940

I had two brothers (Lance) Russell Major and (Ron) Russell Mus and four McDougall cousins at the school. So together with the five Fitzpatrick brothers we made up a reasonable percentage of the 91 boys at St Peter's.

I did not start until the second term of 1948 due to the polio epidemic when all New Zealand schools were closed. I enjoyed a very long break at our holiday house at Orewa doing very little correspondence and a lot of playing around the rocks

St Peter's for me was like a home away from home where I made long lasting friendships. I have fond memories of time spent on the farm, making huts in the Kaikateas, riding our bikes to Karapiro to watch the dam being built, sports days, confirmation classes in chapel and many memorable times. Even some mischief like stealing the bras of Sister Mary Grant and Ngaire Harvey from the changing room whilst they were swimming.

I still have a book called "The Stories of Father Brown" by GK Chesterton given to me by AFB which he signed in the front of the book when I left St Peter's.

From St Peter's I went to King's College from 1954 to 1956. I was in St John's house and enjoyed my time there. I wasn't too bad at running and represented the school in 440yd and 880yd races at the inter-secondary school competitions.

On the weekend 17,18, and 19 October 2014 we celebrated 60 years since starting King's and four of us attending were St Peter's Old Boys. Ross Duder, David Gill, Richard Wrightson and myself.

I was keen to get home onto the family vegetable growing farm. In 1964 I married Helen (Cameron) and we have three daughters who have produced five grandsons and one grand daughter (the youngest). Currently I have four grandsons in St John's house at Kings College. This is in spite of my efforts to encourage them to go to St Peter's. However the much closer proximity to where they live ruled the day.

My career has been growing and exporting vegetables to world markets. I retired in 2002 and am involved in Pukekohe Rotary, Pukekohe Community Action, St Andrews Anglican church, and St Andrews Court (a retirement village) belonging to the church where I am in charge of building new units and maintenance.

Sadly I lost Helen on 30 March 2012 from breast cancer after surviving five and a half years after detection. She lived life to the full right up until the end and together with about twelve of us we had a wonderful week cycling in the McKenzie country. One week later she passed away.

Apart from community activities, some travel and grand children I keep myself fit by riding my bike. I have entered the 200km Conquer Cancer ride again which takes place 15/16 November 2014. Last year our team of three raised \$31,500 which went directly to the Auckland Cancer Research centre.

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JOHN SNELL (1940-1945)

Born: 1 January 1932 Died: 3 January 2014" - Obituary from the Daily Telegraph

John Snell was a heritage railway enthusiast who left BR to run small gauge steam lines such as the Talyllyn and RH&DR

John Snell, who has died aged 82, was a pioneer of railway preservation, firing the first train on the reborn Talyllyn Railway in 1951 and running the Romney, Hythe & Dymchurch for 27 years. A mentor to many as vice-chairman of the Heritage Railway Association, he was also an accomplished railway photographer and author.

Snell's passion for steam was born when, as a 15-year-old schoolboy, he visited the Talyllyn, a North Welsh narrow-gauge line that had been left out of the nationalised British Railways and was on its last legs.

After the death of its owner in 1950, the railway author LTC Rolt set out to rescue the Talyllyn as the world's first

volunteer-operated railway. Snell, waiting to go up to Oxford, wrote to Rolt offering his services.

Rolt recalled: "Though fresh from school and quite unskilled, in looks, manners and sheer height he seemed much older than his age. I could imagine no catastrophe of fire, flood or sudden death dire enough to make John show any excitement or quicken his normal pace... he was to prove a most valuable addition."

On May 14 1951 Snell was on the footplate of locomotive No 2 Dolgoch, heading the preservationists' first train from Towyn to Abergynolwyn. In 2011 Snell would board Dolgoch again on the 60th anniversary of the re-opening.
