# GARY AUSTIN WILSON O.A.M. (1946–1950)

Dear Neil

The last issue of Broadhurst Era News, plus a push from John Duder with whom I shared 11 years of education through school and university, has motivated me to write to you, not least to own up and give more background to the photos on page 15 under "History Refined". I am the boy in the front of the bath photo with Peter Arriens immediately behind me. I remember the occasion of the photos in 1949. A photographer came in to shoot a portfolio of the school in action.

All the photos were carefully stage managed. We had to sit in the baths continually soaping our hair while he set his tripod up and fiddled by my bath. I have attached another staged shot of us in the gym with Mr. Maddick. I don't know if the school has the full portfolio in the archives. Some of the photos such as the Green Dorm appear in the 1949 Chronicle. The back of my print of the bath photo shows the photographer to have been A. H. Breckon of Waimana Avenue, Northcote, Auckland.

Memory is a funny thing. The bath photo has always reminded me of our weekly hair washing ritual. But I have no memory, for example, of ever getting my hair cut at St Peter's, or indeed where or when that might have taken place.

Similarly one can distort history. Thus I found some old Chronicles and the 1950 one shows I was the equal top try scorer for the 1st XV. But to put that into context, my sole try was one of only three tries the team scored all season. I can still remember the circumstances of scoring the try. The only person more surprised than me was our coach Mr. Ball. One reason we may have lost all our matches is the attached photo of the 1st XV. We only have 14 players! A photo of the 1950 prefects is also attached. I can identify those in the photos if required.

When I reviewed the subjects I got prizes for over the years, I note French as taught by AFB was one of them. My written French must have been good because I can clearly remember AFB telling my parents that I spoke it like "a half-caste Belgian miner". Ouch!

You ask the question "What has happened to..?" In this case to the serious boy in the bath. I went to King's College and then Auckland University Engineering School at Ardmore. I graduated at the end of 1959 with a degree in Electrical Engineering and a feeling that New Zealand was a bit of a backwater with no interesting opportunities. So I married an Auckland teacher and we sailed for Australia, ending up in Adelaide. I worked in the Weapons Research Establishment for 4 years on interesting instrumentation projects and then got a promotion to run a section of the Tracking Centre at Woomera. This was at the height of the cold war and I became heavily involved in rocket and missile trials, especially the first Blue Streak firings and the Black Knight re-entry programmes. I built and operated a re-entry computer to enable the Black Knight payloads to be tracked.

But Woomera was no place to bring up a family and it did not have a future. So we moved to Sydney where I worked for a decade for Plessey in the field of Postal Engineering. At that time the Australian Post Office was a world leader



in postal automation and letter sorting, with Plessey their contractor. So much so that another engineer and I found ourselves in Washington DC with our families working for 6 months as consultants to the US Postal Service, assessing and advising on mail handling processes. A coals to Newcastle move by a 31 year old NZ engineer. I ended up as Chief Engineer of the Postal division at Plessey, but after a decade the work ran out.

With the Japanese starting to make their presence felt in electronics, I joined Sony to set up a new division to handle technical and after-sales service matters in Australia. I was there for 20 years as general manager of this division. During this time Sony developed into a market leader in the fields of consumer audio and video products and also into professional equipment. My responsibilities grew similarly and I ended up playing prominent roles in the consumer electronics and service industries in Australia.

Outside of work I have been involved with Toastmasters for nearly 50 years, including serving on their International Board of Directors. This has given me lots of opportunities for major contributions which still continue. We took up bridge on retirement and I have been working as a professional bridge director for over 20 years and still do it.

All of this culminated on Australia Day 2014 when I received an OAM (Order of Australia Medal) for service to the community. My wife resumed her teaching career as our boys grew up and finished as Deputy Principal of an Anglican Girls School. She is a born organiser who becomes heavily involved in organisations she joins. That included having a major career in Toastmasters as well. This resulted in her also receiving an OAM in 2016 for her service to the community. It is quite rare for couples to be independently honoured in this way. The photo shows us at Government House for her investiture.

Australia has been good to us since we came here seeking a land of opportunity 57 years ago. And we like to think that we have been good for Australia too.

### **CAMBRIDGE MUSIC SCHOOL**

The Broadhurst Years 1946-1960

### Helen Taber (Newman) who attended many schools

The Cambridge Music School was held from 1946 until 1986. Over those years, thousands of participants of all ages and levels had the opportunity to further their skills and take advantage of a broadening of knowledge in all genres of music. The Broadhurst years were all held at St Peter's School. AFB attended them as a student.

Early in the New Year, tutors and musicians gathered at the school for two weeks of intensive music making. The first school had over 100 participants, two decades later the total number who had attended over the years was over 3,000. The music schools are still highly rated as the meeting place for scores of the country's best composers and performers. They filled the gap for aspiring professionals until the formation of university music departments up and down the country.

It all started with Owen Jensen, Music Director of Auckland University Adult Education, giving a piano recital at St Peter's during the war. He reported 'there seemed to be a magic about the place'. The concept of a music school would never have got off the ground without the enlightened support of AFB in providing such a perfect setting. A passionate listener of music himself, he passed on an abundance of musical appreciation to his own students. He was an accomplished keyboard player, often sitting down and accompanying his many musical families on trips around New Zealand, as well as playing any string instrument, violin, viola, cello or double bass.

The first music school, as reported in an article in the New Zealand Listener in February 1946, lasted for 11 days in early January. The number of participants, including professionals and amateurs from all around New Zealand was 124. Owen Jensen named the amateurs as clerks, shop assistants, farmers, carpenters, school teachers, private music teachers, business and professional people, housewives, a clergyman, a church organist, compositor, naval air pilot, Karitane nurse and a dress designer. It was hoped that the music school would become 'an annual affair'. Owen Jensen was the Director until 1957 when Stewart Morrison took over for 7 years, followed by Ron Dellow.

AFB was asked to open the first music school, as he did all successive ones until his retirement in 1960. However, in 1946 he was walking up from the swimming pool and was so delighted to hear a pianist practising that he missed the first ceremony!

At this first school, a piece of music was written in AFB's honour 'Serenade to AFB', with separate movements composed by three composers attending the school, Dorothea Franchi, David Farquhar and Owen Jensen. 'Jackson's double bass' was mentioned, then choir master at St Peters.

The second brochure for 1947, gave priority to the practise of music and away from lectures, the pattern followed in successive years. This included two orchestras rehearsing in the mornings, one in the gym (which no longer exists) and the other in the art room. After lunch held in the school dining hall, instrumental players found a free room to rehearse their smaller chamber groups: string quartets, woodwind and brass groups. The tutors rotated to help and mentor. One practised where one could, often under a tree on the other side of the playing fields! There was a piano class, the choir met in the science room, the composers (far away in the then staff room overlooking the chapel path) and organ scholars in the chapel. Morning and afternoon tea was a chance for a good chat (not to mention some successful liaisons!) with other students in the cloister area. AFB is fondly remembered happily participating as any other student, casually dressed in shorts, shirt and brown leather

Tutors, both national and international, rehearsed in AFB's private sitting room. Each evening a concert was presented in the gym by tutors and students. These are remembered as an important part of one's musical education and a chance to hear rarely performed works, e.g. Webern piano music (Robin Maconie) Bartok's solo violin sonatas (Malcolm Latcham), many of the lesser known chamber works and world premieres from the composers. Fun and high jinks were the norm, the tutors entering into the spirit willingly! The Red Spider functioned after 10pm. The playing field was used for friendly rounds of cricket on the one free afternoon and the swimming pool got frequent use.

In 1947 full board was offered for £9, dinner and tea for £6 pounds and the school only for £3. Women slept in the blue, green and crow's nest dormitories, men in the red and orange. There were a small number who lived out, and the remainder camped in the orchard, the area currently beside the modern theatre.

By 1956, 1200 students had attended the school. A selection committee was put in place to limit the school to 170 participants from the over 300 that applied. In 1959 there were 200 participants.

At AFB's last music school in 1960 costs had risen to £18 for full board and £8 10s for the school only. The list of tutors was piano - Janetta McStay, strings - Francis Rossner, Alex Lindsay, Winifred Stiles and John Kennedy, choir - Peter Godfrey, composition - Ron Tremain, early music - Margaret Crawshaw, orchestra conductors - Bill Walden Mills and George Hopkins (also clarinet). The brochure lists recreations as swimming, tennis and dancing as well as music making in ideal surroundings. Stewart Morrison and Rhoda Venables ably manned the office.

John Kennedy, the visiting cello tutor from Australia, had already made contact before the school, asking what was the appropriate dress for concerts, tails, dinner jacket or a suit. The accompanying photo will show that he very quickly entered into the spirit of the school!

I.B. Sutherland composed a string quartet entitled 'AFB' in honour of his last year at the school. AFB himself performed on the viola in a performance of Brahms string sextet. An article from this date about the school states that he 'actively supported every move made to improve its standard'.

It would be difficult to list those who stood out as tutors, suffice it to say that they were all beloved and respected: the charisma of Anthony Camden (oboe from the UK), the legacy of choral music from Peter Godfrey, the musicianship of Georg Tintner (international conductor), the dedication of George and Helen Hopkins (clarinet/conductor and violin) the ongoing contribution to New Zealand composing by Dame Gillian Whitehead.

Alumni who attended include David Farquhar, Stormy Land, Richard Newman, George Connor and Graham Dreadon. Over the years, attendees were university music students, professionals, the odd secondary school student and amateur musicians from all professions. Of the older generation currently playing in New Zealand's amateur orchestras, many would have fond memories of the Cambridge Music School. A lifelong enjoyment of music as a result of AFB's generosity is not forgotten. Thank you Broady.

an interesting character. He was an Irishman, graduate of Trinity College Dublin. He fought with the Irish Fusiliers in World War 1 and was awarded the Military Cross for Bravery in the Battle of the Somme. After the war he travelled a lot teaching at various schools and writing a book on his travels around New Zealand on a bike. In 1954 he came to St Peter's as an assistant Master. I shared the Masters' House with him and got to know him very well.

After some time he retired to Putaruru where he bought a small cottage with a large garden. One night the circus was in town and an elephant escaped ending up in his garden leaving many great potholes! At some time he returned to St Peter's for a short time. He then shifted to Auckland where he bought another small cottage in Titirangi.

He was discontented and using me as a referee ended up at the Ranfurly Home where he died sometime in the late 70's. I can't remember the date but I took his funeral at Waikumete Cemetery. He had visited us on several occasions over the years and to our surprise he left us a pair of silver candlesticks which had been his first prize in the Athletic Sports at his Prep School in Dublin in 1907. They were complete in a satin lined box. What a difference from the usual sports prize of a book! All told a most memorable character!



Dear Neil,

I wish to apologise for being tardy, in relation to a photograph of "The Staff in 1958", in September 2016, Issue 6.

I am sure that the Secretary, Mrs C J Wright (front left), is my mother Mrs Constance Jane White.

She started at the school around that time, and I started at St Peter's in 1959. She used to have a room on the top floor, on the right side of the main building, overlooking the Big Horse-chestnut tree towards Hamilton.

Being quite musical herself, I recall visiting the Smales, in their cottage near the main road, where the Cycling Centre is now. Also, at that time, there was the vineyard, school farm supplying milk and cream for the porridge and in holiday times, my mother and I used to go to the Waikato River for a picnic. I would often find AFB, with other staff

including my mother, playing Scrabble, and AFB would invariably win the game by clearing his tiles.

I have attached some photos of St Peter's in 1959, taken with my Box Brownie. I have to admit that I haven't a good memory for some of the descriptions of them, but do recall being in the plays.

Memories of my mother trying to teach me to play the piano, streaking naked to the swimming pool for a morning swim (or else it was a cold shower), sailing my boat in the sailing pond, making model aeroplanes in the "Craft Room", and walks down the Long Drive on Sunday mornings will happily stay with me for life.

## JOHN HARRIS RUDDENKLAU (1947–1948)

Born 19th August 1935 Died 8th June 2017

John was a pupil at St Peter's from 1947 to 1948 (along with his brother Graham 1947 to 1951). He started in "Middle School 1" and left after 1948 from "Senior School" to attend Fielding Agricultural High School from 1949 to 1952. He went from there to Lincoln College to complete an intensive farming course.

At St Peter's he was confirmed in the School Chapel in 1948. In that year he also played in the 1st XV Rugby and 1st X1 Cricket teams. He won the School Latin and French prizes. He obtained "mentions" in Latin, French, Science, Writing, Piano and Gym.

John was a sheep and cattle farmer but also contributed to the community. He was on the Young Farmers and Federated Farmers local Executive. He won the National Title in the YFC debating in 1963 with his YFC debating team. He was also,

for a period, Chairman of the Waikaremoana Electorate of the National Party.

### The strange connection with Ayrshire

It seems that the Ayrshire born Arthur Broadhurst was walking down Queen Street, Auckland, looking for a firm of solicitors to handle his affairs, when he saw the name 'Oliphant' on a legal plate. Broadhurst knew a solicitor of that name in Ayrshire, so he called on T A H Oliphant (also born in Ayrshire), who became his solicitor. Before returning to England in September 1934 he instructed Tom Oliphant to look out for a property that would be suitable for a school. Oliphant cabled him in late 1934 that he had taken an option on a well-known dairy farm of 90 acres, only two miles from Cambridge and fifteen miles from Hamilton. Broadhurst left England on the first available ship, agreed with his lawyer's choice and then took the next available ship back to England – presumably to wind up his affairs there.

The farm proved a very successful investment, as well as fulfilling its original purpose of providing grounds for the school and farm produce for the school's consumption. The property purchased in 1935 was known as Gwynnelands, after the Royal Gwynne stud. It contained a large homestead, also known as Gwynnelands.

The third member of the triumvirate was Professor William Riddet, also born in Ayrshire. He had been educated at Glasgow University, served in World War I, and became a lecturer in Scotland before being appointed professor of agriculture at Auckland University College in 1925. With Professor Peren, Professor Riddet founded and organised Massey College, which opened in 1928. He became the foundation director of the New Zealand Dairy Research Institute and his contribution to dairy science on a worldwide scale was recognised by leading dairy scientists and by the award of the CBE in 1954. He became a foundation member of the St Peter's School Trust Board and a director of St Peter's Ltd and of the school farm, which proved, largely under his direction, to be an indispensable part of the school's financial organisation.

Broadhurst paid £2,500 for the 90 acres and set aside £71,000 for the construction of the school – a very considerable sum in 1935. Again, when men were needed to lay out the grounds and lawns under the supervision of Ike McKinnon, the orchardist and groundsman, they worked on a government subsidised scheme for ten shillings a week; and when the school was built the construction firm had no difficulty in finding workers. As the Jubilee History commented, 'In depressed times the employment of up to 160 local men at the peak in 1935 must have given the local economy a considerable booSt'

As far as possible the trees and shrubs which gave the property, especially when surrounded by the green rolling Waikato hills, a typically English look, were preserved and increased. The well-known homestead was also preserved, but it was moved to a site a hundred yards nearer the river for its new function as staff accommodation.

#### The Grounds

Ike McKinnon was orchardist and groundsman, and he and his wife began work at St Peter's before the buildings were finished, in 1935, and remained until 1960. They lived in school accommodation and Mrs McKinnon cooked meals when required for farm, garden and teaching staff. Mr and Mrs McKinnon's two daughters were baptised, confirmed and married in the chapel, and A F B Broadhurst was their godfather.

### Roy Lippincott and the Building of the School

Roy Lippincott was born in 1885 at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and graduated with an architectural degree from Cornell University in 1909. He worked in the office of Walter Burley Griffin, who in May 1912 was announced as the winner of the competition to design Canberra, which was to become Australia's federal capital. In January 1914 Lippincott accepted Griffin's offer of a junior partnership; in April he

married Griffin's sister Genevieve; and in May 1914 Griffin and Lippincott, accompanied by their wives, moved to Australia, where Lippincott was put in charge of Griffin's private practice. In 1921 the Lippincotts and their three daughters moved to Auckland when Roy Lippincott won a competition to design the Auckland University arts building, which was much admired.

From 1924 until 1939 Lippincott was in independent

practice in Auckland, during which time he designed several more buildings for Auckland University College, for Massey Agricultural College, for Smith & Caughey, and for John Seabrook. His first office was in Queen Street, in



the prestigious NZ Insurance Company building, but with the depression there was less work and Lippincott moved his office to 10 High Street in Oliphant House, where the law firm of Oliphant, Bell and Moss was situated. This firm handled Lippincott's affairs, and Tom Oliphant, Broadhurst's lawyer, recommended Lippincott to BroadhurSt

The St Peter's commission was very welcome. In the early 1930s little building work had been available so that the Lippincott office was closed and he worked from home. Things had not greatly improved by 1935, and this was a favourable time for those with capital (such as Broadhurst).

Broadhurst and Lippincott had several discussions before Broadhurst went back to England to put his affairs in order prior to his return to New Zealand. Lippincott had undertaken to send him preliminary drawings, and did so. Broadhurst's reactions were not always favourable – R R Gibson wrote that when the drawings reached Broadhurst 'They were returned to Lippincott with scathing criticisms and the comment that he [AFB] wanted "a country-house type of school, not a National Memorial!". Lippincott, a charming American, started again and St Peter's as we know it was built.'

The final designs produced attractive buildings which were impressive and functional without being ostentatious and which made the most of the site – slightly elevated and containing attractive woodland, most of which was preserved. The main block was constructed of concrete with (originally) plaster of a warm rich buff colour. Other buildings were built of timber stained to give a matt dark tobacco-brown finish. 'Heating methods were well in

advance of their time, using warm air, convected through ducts from beds of sand and rock below the floor, heated by off-peak electricity.' This required underground tunnels, which proved an illegal attraction for adventurous small boys. The dining hall (or refectory) had impressive and attractive wooden beams, and the chapel was built of wood, comparatively plain, yet compact and intimate and set apart from other buildings.

### The Governance of the School

Trustees and directors. By the end of 1939 the trustees of St Peter's School were Broadhurst, Riddet, T A H Oliphant and N M P Gibson, headmaster of Dilworth School. Broadhurst, no doubt on the advice of Tom Oliphant, formed a company under the Companies Act of 1933.

St Peter's Limited was officially formed on 6 March 1935, with a capital of £50,000, of which Broadhurst and Beaufort as joint headmasters and directors each took £1000 in ordinary shares and Broadhurst took £48,000 of £1 preference shares. Broadhurst bought out Beaufort when the joint headmastership was dissolved.

The St Peter's Trust was established by Broadhurst in 1939. By this he gave the whole of his interest in the school, which by then consisted of 264 acres of land, and buildings and equipment valued at over £100,000, to the truSt Broadhurst wrote in the 1939 Chronicle, 'My object in doing this was to make it as certain as is humanly and legally possible that the school will continue to be carried on when I am gone.'

#### **Staff**

The number of staff at St Peter's when it opened in February 1936 exceeded the number of boys on the roll (36). There was twelve teaching staff, three house staff, a secretary and fourteen domestic staff – cooks, laundresses, waitresses, maids (the headmaster had a maid to himself) and kitchen staff. Then there were the farm staff, who looked after the cows, sheep and hens; an orchardist/groundsman; and a fluctuating number of others who found plenty to do in landscaping, fencing, mowing, planting, etc in the early days.

### And so St Peter's was Underway

### **Excellence in Multisport**


St Peter's students had a successful day at the Waikato BOP Individual Duathlon Championships, taking two gold medals and one silver medal.



Jon was an inspirational figure at St Peter's and also in his life post St Peter's.

He came to St Peter's in the second term in 1954 starting in "Middle School II". He completed his time at St Peter's as Head Prefect in 1957 in "Upper School 1" (having also been a prefect in 1956).

In 1957 he won the Waller Cup for Swimming and the Larner Cup for best all round athlete. He won the "Headmasters Medal" for English Speaking as well as the school prizes for Geography, Science & Art. He received mentions for Latin, French, Geography, Science Art, Gym and Industry.

Jon was also Captain of the 1st X1 Hockey team and awarded school colours, was in the Rugby 1st XV and awarded colours as well as playing in the 1st X1 Cricket Team.

From St Peter's Jon went on to complete his schooling at Kings College, Auckland.

Jon began his career as a producer in New Zealand. He joined Saatchi and Saatchi as director of TV production in 1975, where he oversaw the creation of memorable commercials for clients including British Rail, Lanson, Procter & Gamble, Cadbury-Schweppes and Campbells.

A founding partner, Bill Muirhead, a former chairman of Saatchi & Saatchi Europe, described Jon as "always positive. He was one of those people you felt better after you'd seen than before. He played a large part in the great TV work that Saatchi & Saatchi produced during a famous period of its history." Bill, who worked with Jon on Air New Zealand, the Saatchi agency's first airline account, said: "I made the mistake of challenging Jon to a swimming race in Cannes. I reckoned I was pretty good but Jon seemed to fly across the top of the water."

As head of the Charlotte Street TV department (in London) for 14 years, Jon supervised and produced a slew of award-winning commercials. They included his particular favourite, the 1983 "Manhattan" spot for British Airways, the Spielberg-inspired spectacular that helped changed perceptions of the beleaguered airline as it was being readied for privatisation.

In 1988 Jon took on wider responsibilities, investigating the broadcast opportunities of sponsorship and barter syndication available to the Saatchi worldwide network and its clients amid rapidly changing TV markets and new legislation in Britain and Europe. He left the agency in 1989 after the group decided not to proceed with the venture.

After quitting Saatchi & Saatchi, Jon ran his own commercial and corporate film company, Jon Staton Productions, producing commercials and corporate videos for a wide range of well-known advertisers.

He is survived by his wife, Shelagh and his daughters Sian and Jessie.
